BUILDING PARTNERSHIPS TO GROW COMMUNITY:

THE POWER OF PEOPLE TOGETHER

The work on the Senior Resource Directory and in the Lewis Place Garden exemplifies the civic and communal values of local people and organizations. Money can buy many things, but mutual respect and trust are built action by action, step by step. Despite the pandemic, this St Louis community effort perseveres. Many thanks to all the volunteers who spent countless hours on

the resource directory and the garden beautification project.

A core value of STLV is to create a diverse and inclusive community that represents the demographics of St Louis. To move forward on that goal, the Community Engagement Committee (CEC) was organized to connect with underserved neighborhoods and build mutually helpful relationships. It was residents from Lewis Place and adjacent Fountain Park neighborhoods serving on the CEC who suggested the restoration of the community garden, building on previous joint projects and events with LPHP and its neighborhood association, including an advocacy training Workshop, tour and discussion of St. Louis #1 in Civil Rights at the St. Louis History Museum, and Gray Power.

THE LEWIS PLACE COMMUNITY GARDEN AND MISS HENRIETTA PARRAM

Looking back after months of hard work despite a pandemic and an economy in free-fall, the long-standing leadership and inspiration of **Henrietta Parram**, a member of both LPHP and STLV, was even more key than many realized at the time. The Lewis Place Community Garden was established in 2009 as a sustainable organic vegetable, fruit, and flower garden on North Taylor at Lewis Place (adjacent to the Commemorative Arch). Miss Henrietta championed the garden and attracted youth and elders alike to sustain it.

A longtime resident of the nearby Fountain Park neighborhood, Miss Henrietta was passionate about the garden and recently explained to a newcomer that “we do not have any fences around our garden. Anyone can come in and get anything. Everyone is welcome here. Our children and seniors started this garden.” She worked tirelessly to persuade people and to grow vegetables, to beautify both the spiritual and physical landscape, coordinating tasks to match the seasons.

As a result of the coronavirus pandemic, the Lewis Place Community Garden remained dormant during the spring and summer of 2020. However, thanks to the commitment and hard work of STL Village members and community residents, the garden was restored, and planting took place. Sadly, Miss Henrietta passed away suddenly during this transformative time, but her legacy continues with each seed that is planted, each flower that blooms, in the young and old who nurture them. ABOUT THIS DIRECTORY

The goal of this Senior Resource Directory is to provide useful information for older adults who desire to “age in their own homes.” It is designed to help residents who do not use the internet or social media as well as for those who do. The preparers of this directory specifically researched providers and agencies pertinent to older adults. However, we hope that all users of the directory will find the information helpful and easily accessible.

The listings, with some exceptions, are local. In this era, information is updated often online and this is a printed document, so expect change. Please be aware that some of the contact information and hours of operation for the listings contained in the directory may have changed. It is important that you call to confirm whether the business/agency is currently open and its hours of operation. Likewise, reconfirm eligibility and other details before acting based on information in a particular listing. Remember that librarians can help you search for information online.

We minimized listing some organizations multiple times by dividing the directory into two main parts: Section One lists agencies that provide multiple types of information and help. This section is divided into a section listing organizations serving everyone and ones dedicated and tailored to the needs of older adults. Section Two lists agencies and organizations that focus on one type of information and service—for example, dental care. Throughout, entries are listed alphabetically.
